## **World Language Requirements:**

*Student seeking the degree of Bachelor of Arts must complete one of the three options listed below:*

- 1) Completion of the second level of a world language (course number 102).
  - \*Student may test out of the course
  - \*Completion of a world language course above 102 with a grade of C or better will satisfy the requirement
- 2) Completion of WL 100, Introduction to Comparative Linguistics, & ANTHR/ENG 106, Language Thought and Culture.
- 3) Completion of the second level of American Sign Language.

## **Institutional Graduation Requirements:**

- Total of 120 semester hours, minimum.
- Complete a minimum of 40 semester hours in upper-division courses.
- Overall cumulative grade point average of 2.00.
- A minimum of 60 sem hours must be earned from a four-year institution. Of these, a minimum of 30 sem hours of credit must be earned in residence.
- Of the last 30 semester credits earned immediately preceding graduation, no more than 15 may be completed at other colleges or universities.
- All other requirements as specified in the Catalog.

## **Additional Major Graduation Requirements:**

- No grade below C is acceptable in the major.
- Completion of at least 36 credit hours in approved criminology courses. (With a criminology advisor's approval, criminology majors can apply up to 6.0 credits of anthropology or sociology coursework toward a criminology major.)
